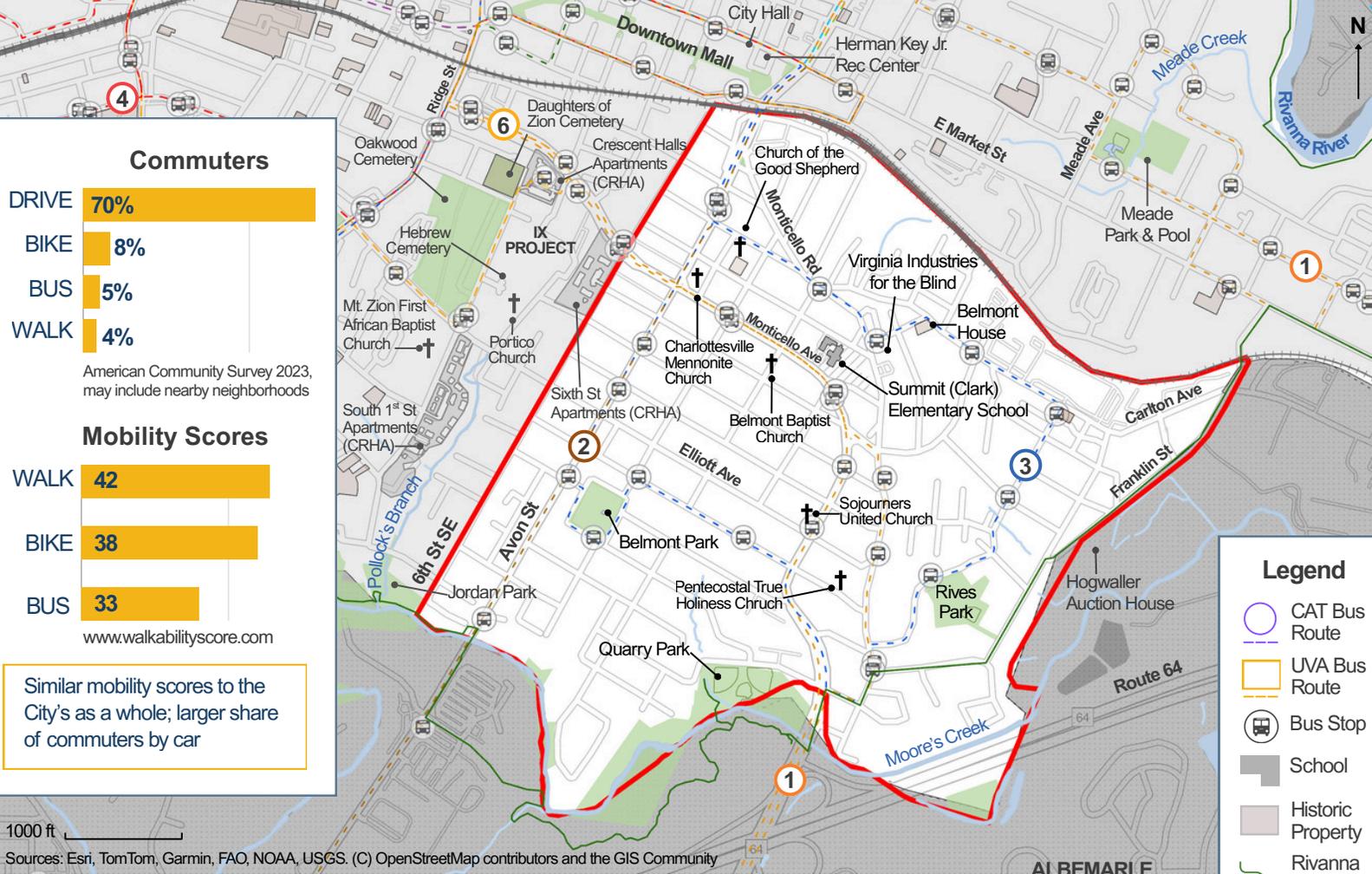

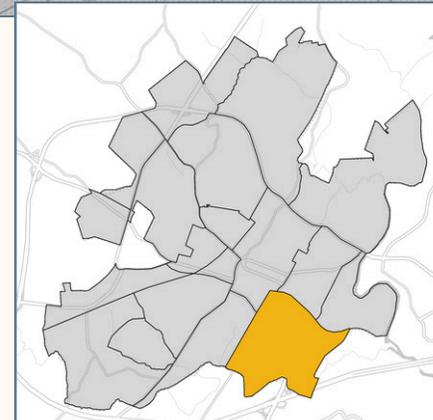

The present-day Belmont neighborhood was known in the early 1800s as the Belle-Mont plantation, renamed Belmont as a horse farm in 1847, and then starting in the 1890s as two subdivisions, "Belmont" and "Carlton" that were aimed at middle- and upper-class families. The neighborhood's growth was helped by the 1905 construction of the Old Belmont Bridge (replaced in 1961 and recently in 2024) over the railroad tracks where the C&O train depot and station, now an office building, were located. Most homes in the northern part of Belmont date from the 1890s to 1940s; those in the southern part are from the mid- and late-20th century. At the intersection of Monticello Rd and Carlton Ave is a vibrant restaurant scene; offices and industrial uses are clustered along the railroad tracks and Carlton Road.

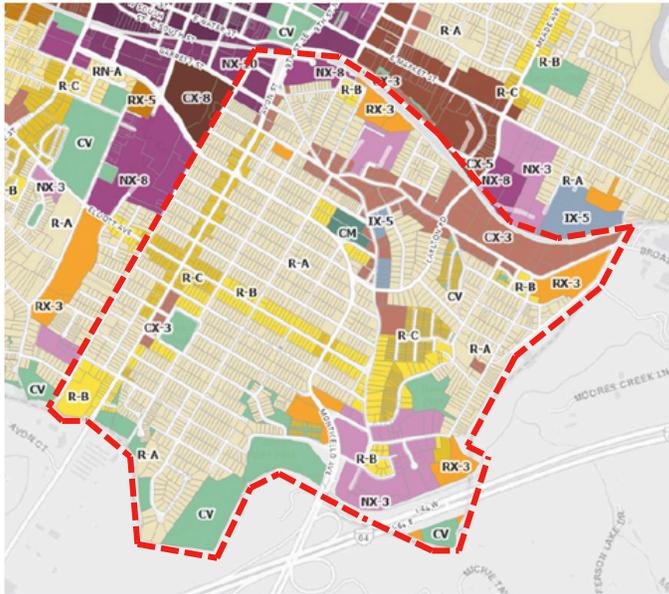

ZONING

What kinds of buildings can be built, and where?



ZONING ORDINANCE (adopted 2024)

Most of Belmont is zoned **R-A**. This allows a base level maximum of 3 residential units per lot, and 4 units if the existing home is preserved.

Avon St, Elliott Ave, and the southern portion of Monticello Rd are zoned **R-B** or **R-C**, residential-only areas with base levels of 6 and 8 units.

Parts of Avon St, Monticello Rd, downtown Belmont, and Carlton Ave are zoned **CX-3**, allowing a mix of uses at a base level maximum of 3 stories. **RX-3** and **NX-3** zones along the railroad tracks and south of Rives Park are similar.

Small areas on either side of Belmont Bridge are zoned **NX-8** and **NX-10**, mixed use zones with base levels of 8 and 10 stories.
