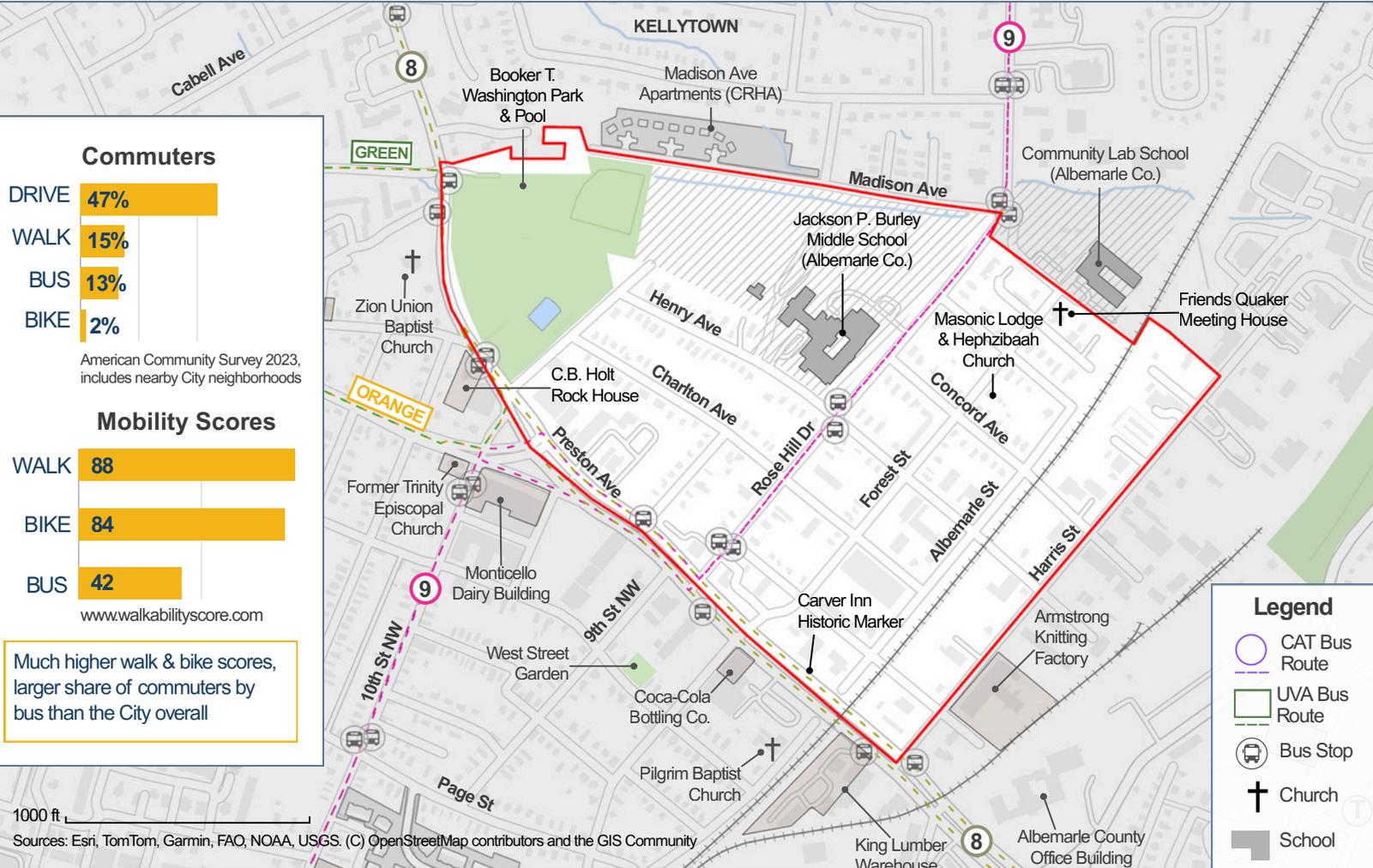

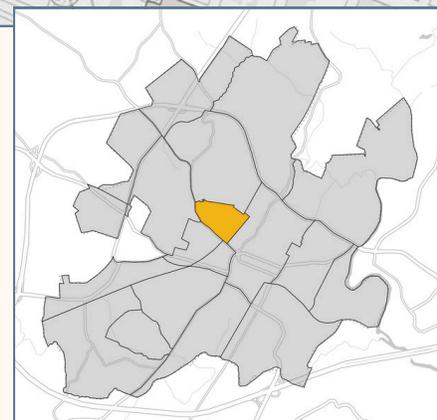

Originally part of a plantation established by an associate of Thomas Jefferson's, land in Rose Hill was first subdivided and sold to emancipated Black families in the mid-1800s. Rose Hill officially became part of the city of Charlottesville in 1916. In 1926, Paul Goodloe McIntire donated the land for Washington Park; during this time of segregation it was reserved solely for Black residents. Jackson P. Burley, a prominent Black businessman, donated the land for Burley High School that served Black students from 1951 until segregation was ended in 1967; today it is an Albemarle County middle school. The historic Carver Inn, which provided lodging, dining, and entertainment during segregation, was razed in the 1970s when Preston Avenue was widened to the north.

## ZONING

What kinds of buildings can be built, and where?



ZONING ORDINANCE (adopted 2024)

In early 2024, City Council designated Rose Hill a “**Core Neighborhood**” and zoned its residential areas **RN-A**. This allows no more than one existing home per lot, plus one added unit.

Much of Preston Avenue was named a “**Core Neighborhood Corridor**” with a **CX-3** base height of three stories and strict conditions to be met in order to build taller.

Existing commercial and residential areas between Rose Hill Drive and the railroad are zoned **NX-3**, allowing a mix of those uses, at a base height of 3 stories.

Lots along Harris Street are zoned **IX-5** or **IX-8**, with industrial, commercial, and residential uses allowed at a base height of 5 or 8 stories.
